SECTION 1. Section 22-10A-4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, Chapter 153, Section 35, as amended by Laws 2005, Chapter 315, Section 4 and by Laws 2005, Chapter 316, Section 1) is amended to read:

"22-10A-4. TEACHERS [AND], SCHOOL ADMINISTRATORS, <u>DUAL-</u> <u>LICENSED INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT PROVIDERS AND DUAL-LICENSED</u> <u>INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT PROGRAM ADMINISTRATORS</u>--PROFESSIONAL STATUS--LICENSURE LEVELS--SALARY ALIGNMENT.--

A. Teaching [and], school administration <u>and dual-</u> <u>licensed instructional support</u> are recognized as professions, with all the rights, responsibilities and privileges accorded professions, having their first responsibility to the public they serve. The primary responsibilities of the teaching and school administration professions are to educate the children of this state and to improve the professional practices and ethical conduct of their members. <u>The primary responsibilities</u> <u>of dual-licensed instructional support providers are to assist</u> <u>and support students and teachers and to improve the</u> professional practices and ethical conduct of their members.

B. The New Mexico licensure framework for teachers [and], school administrators, <u>dual-licensed instructional</u> <u>support providers and dual-licensed instructional support</u> <u>program administrators</u> is a progressive career system in which licensees are required to demonstrate increased competencies .219081.1AIC February 10, 2021 (8:28am) - 2 -

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and undertake increased duties as they progress through the licensure levels. The minimum salary provided as part of the career system shall not take effect until the department has adopted increased competencies for the particular level of licensure and a highly objective uniform statewide standard of evaluation.

C. A level one license is a provisional license that gives a beginning teacher or dual-licensed instructional support provider the opportunity, through a formal mentorship program, for additional preparation to be a quality teacher or dual-licensed instructional support provider. A level two license is given to a teacher or dual-licensed instructional support provider who is a fully qualified professional who is primarily responsible for ensuring that students meet and exceed department-adopted academic content and performance standards or primarily responsible for ensuring that students with physical or intellectual developmental delays or disabilities, behavioral problems or other conditions that need the services of a dual-licensed instructional support provider are being treated as required. A teacher or dual-licensed instructional support provider may choose to remain at level two for the remainder of the teacher's or dual-licensed instructional support provider's career. A level three-A license is the highest level of teaching or dual-licensed instructional support licensure for those teachers and dual-

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<u>licensed instructional support providers</u> who choose to advance as instructional <u>or instructional support</u> leaders in the teaching <u>or specific dual-licensed</u> profession and undertake greater responsibilities such as curriculum development <u>for</u> <u>teachers and peer intervention and mentoring for both teachers</u> <u>and dual-licensed instructional support providers</u>. A level three-B license is for teachers <u>and dual-licensed instructional</u> <u>support providers</u> who commence a new career path in school <u>or</u> <u>professional</u> administration by becoming school administrators <u>or dual-licensed instructional support program administrators</u>.

D. [All] <u>The</u> teacher [and], school administrator, <u>dual-licensed instructional support provider and dual-licensed</u> <u>instructional support program administrator</u> salary [systems] <u>system</u> shall be aligned with the licensure framework in a professional educator <u>and instructional support provider</u> licensing and salary system.

E. All teachers and school administrators who hold teaching or administrator certificates on the effective date of the 2003 act shall meet the requirements for their level of licensure by September 1, 2006 and shall be issued licenses.

F. A dual-licensed instructional support provider is licensed in one of the following professions:

(1) audiologist;

(2) interpreter for the deaf;

(3) speech-language pathologist;

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(5) psychologist;

(6) social worker;

(7) nurse;

(8) counselor;

(9) physical therapist;

(10) occupational therapist; and

(11) any other professional that meets the educational, licensure and other qualifications to be a duallicensed instructional support provider."

SECTION 2. Section 22-10A-7 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, Chapter 153, Section 38, as amended by Laws 2019, Chapter 206, Section 21 and by Laws 2019, Chapter 207, Section 21) is amended to read:

"22-10A-7. LEVEL ONE LICENSURE.--

A. A level one license is a provisional five-year license for beginning teachers <u>and dual-licensed instructional</u> <u>support professionals</u> that requires as a condition of licensure that the licensee undergo a formal mentorship program for at least one full school year and an annual intensive performance evaluation by a school administrator for at least three full school years before applying for a level two license.

B. Each school district, in accordance with department rules, shall provide for the mentorship and evaluation of level one teachers <u>and dual-licensed</u>

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instructional support providers. At the end of each year and at the end of the license period, the level one teacher <u>and</u> <u>dual-licensed instructional support provider</u> shall be evaluated for competency. If the teacher <u>or dual-licensed instructional</u> <u>support provider</u> fails to demonstrate satisfactory progress and competence annually, the teacher <u>or dual-licensed instructional</u> <u>support provider</u> may be terminated as provided in Section 22-10A-24 NMSA 1978. If the teacher <u>or dual-licensed</u> <u>instructional support provider</u> has not demonstrated satisfactory progress and competence by the end of the fiveyear period, the teacher <u>or dual-licensed instructional support</u> <u>provider</u> shall not be granted a level two license.

C. Except in exigent circumstances defined by department rule, a level one license shall not be extended beyond the initial period.

D. The department shall issue a standard level one license to an applicant who is at least eighteen years of age who:

(1) if a teacher:

(a) holds a baccalaureate degree from an accredited educational institution;

[(2)] <u>(b)</u> has successfully completed a department-approved teacher preparation program from a nationally accredited or state-approved educational institution;

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[(4)] <u>(d)</u> meets other qualifications for level one licensure, including clearance of the required background check; <u>and</u>

(2) if a licensed professional seeking dual licensure as an instructional support provider:

(a) holds a baccalaureate or higher degree from an accredited educational institution as required for professional licensure;

(b) holds a New Mexico license to

practice the instructional support provider's profession; and (c) has passed any department

examination or additional qualification requirements required by the department, including clearance of the required background check.

E. The department shall issue an alternative level one license <u>for teachers</u> to an applicant who meets the requirements of Section 22-10A-8 NMSA 1978.

F. The department shall establish competencies and qualifications for specific grade levels, types and subject areas of level one licensure, including early childhood,

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elementary, middle school, secondary, special and vocational education <u>for teachers and, as appropriate, dual-licensed</u> <u>instructional support providers</u>.

G. The minimum salary for a level one teacher <u>or</u> <u>dual-licensed instructional support provider</u> is [forty thousand dollars (\$40,000)] HEC→forty thousand dollars (\$40,000)←HEC HEC→forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000)←HEC for a standard nine and one-half month contract; provided that teachers <u>and</u> <u>dual-licensed instructional support providers, if applicable</u>, in an extended learning time program or K-5 plus program shall receive additional salary at the same rate as their base salary for that teaching <u>or instructional support</u> time."

SECTION 3. Section 22-10A-10 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, Chapter 153, Section 41, as amended by Laws 2019, Chapter 191, Section 1 and by Laws 2019, Chapter 206, Section 22 and also by Laws 2019, Chapter 207, Section 22) is amended to read:

"22-10A-10. LEVEL TWO LICENSURE.--

A. A level two license is a nine-year license granted to a teacher <u>or dual-licensed instructional support</u> <u>provider</u> who meets the qualifications for that level and who annually demonstrates essential competency to teach <u>or provide</u> <u>professional instructional support</u>. If a level two teacher <u>or</u> <u>dual-licensed instructional support provider</u> does not demonstrate essential competency in a given school year, the school district shall provide the teacher <u>or dual-licensed</u>

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<u>instructional support provider</u> with additional professional development and peer intervention during the following school year. If by the end of that school year, the teacher <u>or dual-</u> <u>licensed instructional support provider</u> fails to demonstrate essential competency, a school district may choose not to contract with the teacher to teach in the classroom <u>or may</u> <u>reassign the dual-licensed instructional support provider</u>.

B. The department shall issue a level two license to an applicant who has successfully taught <u>or provided</u> <u>professional instructional support</u> at least three, but no more than five, years as a level one teacher <u>or dual-licensed</u> <u>instructional support provider</u> or an alternative level one teacher, or a combination of the two <u>for teachers</u>, or is granted reciprocity as provided by department rules. An applicant for a level two license shall:

(1) demonstrate essential competency required by the department as verified by the local superintendent through the highly objective uniform statewide standard of evaluation; and

(2) meet other qualifications as required by the department.

C. The department shall provide for qualifications for specific grade levels, types and subject areas of level two licensure, including early childhood, elementary, middle, secondary, special and vocational education <u>for teachers and</u>,

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as appropriate, dual-licensed instructional support providers.

D. The minimum salary for a level two teacher <u>or</u> <u>dual-licensed instructional support provider</u> is [fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000)] HEC→fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000)←HEC HEC→fifty-five thousand dollars (\$55,000)←HEC for a standard nine and one-half month contract; provided that teachers <u>or</u> <u>dual-licensed instructional support providers</u> in an extended learning time program or K-5 plus program shall receive additional salary at the same rate as their base salary for that teaching <u>or instructional support</u> time."

SECTION 4. Section 22-10A-11 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2003, Chapter 153, Section 42, as amended by Laws 2019, Chapter 206, Section 23 and by Laws 2019, Chapter 207, Section 23) is amended to read:

"22-10A-11. LEVEL THREE LICENSURE--TRACKS FOR TEACHERS--TRACKS FOR DUAL-LICENSED INSTRUCTIONAL SUPPORT PROVIDERS.--

A. A level three-A license is a nine-year license granted to a teacher <u>or dual-licensed instructional support</u> <u>provider</u> who meets the qualifications for that level and who annually demonstrates instructional leader <u>or professional</u> <u>instructional support</u> competencies. If a level three-A teacher <u>or dual-licensed instructional support provider</u> does not demonstrate essential competency in a given school year, the school district shall provide the teacher <u>or dual-licensed</u> <u>instructional support provider</u> with additional professional

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B. The department shall grant a level three-A license to an applicant who has been a level two teacher for at least three years and holds a post-baccalaureate degree or national board for professional teaching standards certification; demonstrates instructional leader competence as required by the department and verified by the local superintendent through the highly objective uniform statewide standard of evaluation; and meets other qualifications for the license.

<u>C. The department shall grant a level three-A</u> <u>license to an applicant who has been a level two dual-licensed</u> <u>instructional support provider for at least three years and</u> <u>holds a master's or doctoral degree in the provider's licensed</u> <u>profession.</u>

[€.] <u>D.</u> The minimum salary for a level three-A teacher <u>or dual-licensed instructional support provider</u> is [sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000)] HEC→sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000)←HEC HEC→sixty-five thousand dollars (\$65,000)←HEC for a standard nine and one-half month contract; provided that .219081.1AIC February 10, 2021 (8:28am) - 11 -

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[D. The minimum salary for a counselor who holds a level three or three-A license as provided in the School Personnel Act and rules promulgated by the department shall be the same as provided for level three-A teachers pursuant to Subsection C of this section.]"

SECTION 5. Section 22-10A-11.4 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2015, Chapter 74, Section 2, as amended by Laws 2019, Chapter 206, Section 24 and by Laws 2019, Chapter 207, Section 24) is amended to read:

"22-10A-11.4. LEVEL THREE-B ADMINISTRATOR'S LICENSE--TRACKS FOR SCHOOL ADMINISTRATOR <u>AND DUAL-LICENSED INSTRUCTIONAL</u> SUPPORT PROGRAM ADMINISTRATOR LICENSURE.--

A. A level three-B administrator's license is a five-year license granted to an applicant who meets the qualifications for that license. Licenses may be renewed upon satisfactory annual demonstration of instructional leader and administrative competency.

B. The department shall grant a level three-B administrator's license to an applicant who:

(1) for school administrators:

[(1)] (a) has completed a department-

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[(2)] <u>(b)</u> holds a current level two or level three teacher's license; and

[(3)] <u>(c)</u> holds a post-baccalaureate degree or national board for professional teaching standards certification; and

(2) for dual-licensed instructional support program administrators:

(a) has completed a department-approved dual-licensed instructional support program administrator preparation program, if required by the department;

(b) holds a professional license and a current level two or three-A instructional support provider license; and

(c) holds a post-baccalaureate degree.

C. The minimum annual salary for a licensed school principal or assistant school principal is the minimum salary for a level three-A teacher multiplied by the applicable responsibility factor. <u>The minimum salary for a dual-licensed</u> <u>instructional support program administrator shall be the same</u> <u>as an assistant school principal multiplied by the applicable</u> <u>responsibility factor.</u>

D. The department shall adopt a highly objective uniform statewide standard of evaluation, including data sources linked to student achievement and an educational plan .219081.1AIC February 10, 2021 (8:28am) - 13 - for student success progress, for school principals and assistant school principals and rules for the implementation of that evaluation system linked to the level of responsibility at each school level.

E. As used in this section, "level three-B administrator's license" means a five-year license granted to an applicant who meets the qualifications pursuant to this section and department rules."

HEC→SECTION 6. APPLICABILITY.--The provisions of this act apply to the 2022-2023 and subsequent school years. HEC→SECTION 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.--The effective date of the provisions of this act is July 1, 2021. ←HEC

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
