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AN ACT
MAKING GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

"SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE FISCAL YEAR 2022
APPROPRIATIONS.--Three hundred fifty thousand dollars
(\$350,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the
legislative finance committee for expenditure in fiscal years
2022 and 2023 to contract for consultants to assess
improvements needed to health benefits procurement to ensure
fairness, health improvement and cost-effectiveness. Any
unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of
fiscal year 2023 shall revert to the general fund.

SECTION 2. JUDICIAL FISCAL YEAR 2022
APPROPRIATIONS.--The appropriations in this section are from
the general fund for the following agencies for expenditure
in fiscal years 2022 and 2023 for the purposes specified and,
unless otherwise indicated, the unexpended or unencumbered
balance of an appropriation in this section at the end of
fiscal year 2023 shall revert to the general fund:

A. to the court of appeals, fifty thousand dollars
(\$50,000) to improve and enhance the timely processing of
judicial appeals;

B. to the administrative office of the courts:

1 (1) one hundred thirty thousand dollars
2 (\$130,000) to expand the state bar's volunteer attorney pool
3 to provide legal assistance to low- and moderate-income
4 persons who are not qualified or are conflicted out of the
