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AN ACT

MAKING GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES;  
PROVIDING AN EXCEPTION TO LEGISLATIVE CONFIDENTIALITY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE FISCAL YEAR 2022

APPROPRIATION.--Two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the legislative council service for expenditure in fiscal years 2022 and 2023 for cybersecurity systems and operations for the legislative information system. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 2023 shall revert to the general fund.

SECTION 2. JUDICIAL FISCAL YEAR 2022

APPROPRIATIONS.--The appropriations in this section are from the general fund for the following agencies for expenditure in fiscal years 2022 and 2023 for the purposes specified and, unless otherwise indicated, the unexpended or unencumbered balance of an appropriation in this section at the end of fiscal year 2023 shall revert to the general fund:

A. to the court of appeals, fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to improve and enhance the timely processing of judicial appeals;

B. to the administrative office of the courts:

(1) one hundred thirty thousand dollars

1 (\$130,000) to expand New Mexico's statewide volunteer  
2 attorney pool to provide legal assistance to low- and  
3 moderate-income persons who are not qualified or are  
4 conflicted out of the legal aid volunteer attorney pool; and

20 hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) to upgrade  
21 courtroom technology in San Juan county;

22 G. to the district attorney of the first judicial  
23 district, three hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$360,000) for  
24 an integrated prosecution, intervention and diversion data  
25 system; and

1 H. to the district attorney of the sixth judicial  
2 district, one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) to purchase  
3 and install forensic interviewing and information technology  
4 equipment.

5 SECTION 3. GENERAL CONTROL FISCAL YEAR 2022

8 appropriations contained in this act as it passed the  
9 legislature, the name of each legislator who allocated a  
10 portion of the appropriation and the amount of the verified  
11 allocation. The list shall be published no earlier than the  
12 day after the governor signs this act and no later than thirty  
13 days after adjournment of the third special session of the
