SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

House Bill 123 (HB0123) proposes regulation to address the economic contributions and rights of individuals who cohabit as a couple without being married. Below is a summary of its key provisions:

- Defines "cohabitants" as two individuals living together as a couple who are not married to each other and meet the age of majority or emancipation.
- Includes terms like "cohabitants' agreement" (a contract between cohabitants) and "contributions to the relationship" (efforts or services benefiting the relationship).
- The act governs contractual and equitable claims between cohabitants relating to their contributions to the relationship.
- Allows cohabitants (or their estates) to bring claims based on contributions, even after the relationship ends.
- Specifies that claims cannot be dismissed due to the existence of a sexual relationship or marriage between the cohabitants.
- Such agreements may be oral, written, or implied.
- Contributions to the relationship are sufficient consideration to establish an agreement.
- Certain terms, such as those affecting a child's right to support, are unenforceable.
- Provides for equitable claims related to property contributions during the relationship.
- Courts must consider factors like the value of contributions, reliance on representations, and the intention to share property.
- Supplements existing law unless inconsistent with the act.
