BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: This bill amends Section 35-1-10 NMSA 1978 (Laws 1968, Chapter 62, Section 12, as amended) to include two additional NM towns—Sunland Park and Chaparral— to the circuit ridden by the seven Dona Ana County magistrate judges. (Circuit riding is the practice of a judge, sometimes referred to as a "circuit rider," traveling to a judicial district to preside over court cases there.) The addition of Sunland Park and Chaparral doubles the size of the circuit for which the judges would be responsible, as the current statute includes only Anthony and Hatch.

CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP — HB 144, also sponsored by Rep. Sarah Silva, amends an existing New Mexico law regarding the Otero County Magistrate Court to establish a riding circuit to Chaparral. Specifically, the bill modifies NMSA 1978 Section 35-1-22 to require the two existing magistrates in the Otero magistrate district (currently operating out of Alamogordo) to rotate and provide court services in Chaparral on a regular schedule. This change likely aims to improve access to judicial services for residents of Chaparral, ensuring they can more conveniently interact with the magistrate court without having to travel to Alamogordo for every legal matter. The bill maintains the existing structure of having two magistrate divisions but expands their operational reach to include Chaparral as a regular service location.

Therefore, it appears that between HB 188 and HB 144, magistrate services would be expanded to include Chaparral for both Otero and Dona Ana counties.
