# **SECTION III: NARRATIVE**

#### **BILL SUMMARY**

Synopsis: HB214 creates the Doula Credentialling and Access Act, which requires that the Secretary of the Department of Health to promulgate rules to:

- 1. Establish and administer a program to credential doulas;
- 2. Create procedures for the receipt and review of applications for initial credentialling;
- 3. Establish standards for continuing education, professional development, and mentorship;
- 4. Create a workforce development plan;
- 5. Establish procedures for disciplinary action;
- 6. Develop and operate an online directory; and
- 7. Other matters that the Secretary of the Department of Health may deem necessary.

HB214 would also create a "credentialed doula" designation, that would allow a doula to register as a Medicaid provider and grants the Department of Health the ability to issue cease and desist orders to persons who violate the Act. HB214 also creates a Doula Credentialling Advisory Council, a fifteen member council that is mandated to meet at least quarterly to develop standards and requirements for education, training, and experience, creating a workforce development plan, and developing methods for collecting information regarding provision of services. This bill also requires that the Department of Health share disaggregated non-personal identifying information regarding the provision of credentialed doula services. HB214 requires hospitals and freestanding birth centers to share information regarding doula services and creates a fund for grants.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Though HB214 creates the "Doula Fund," this bill does not include an appropriation to the fund. The Doula Fund will need to continue to grow to support the increasing workforce demand as well as the increasing professional development requirements and training needs of said workforce.

# WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

Existing doulas in underserved communities will continue to be unable to bill Medicaid for services provided. These individuals are faced with securing grants and other funding sources to fund the work they do which is not sustainable to continue to serve the families in need of the services.

If HB214 is not enacted, doulas in the New Mexico will not be credentialled by the State of New Mexico, and uniform requirements for doulas will not be imposed. Additionally, New Mexican families will not receive information regarding doula services from hospitals and freestanding birth centers.
