BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

The House Health and Human Services Committee (HHHC) amendment to HB 303 removes the proposed language in Section 30-6-1 NMSA 1978, Subsections I and J, which stated that, in instances when a child was allowed to be in a place where controlled substances were manufactured or methamphetamines were used, it shall be no defense that the defendant did not know that “a child was present, a child could be found, a child resided on the premises or a vehicle contained a child.”
