SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Creates a higher level of careless driving with a higher penalty: careless driving that results in death or great bodily harm to another constitutes a misdemeanor and carries a penalty of imprisonment in the county jail for a definite term less than one year or a fine of no more than \$1,000, or both. Defines great bodily harm as an injury that creates a high probability of death, that causes serious disfigurement or that causes loss of function of any member or organ of the body.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

No fiscal impact to DPS.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

No significant issues to DPS.

UJI 14-131 defines "great bodily harm" as "an injury to a person which [creates a high probability of death] [or] [results in serious disfigurement] [or] [results in loss of any member or organ of the body] [or] [results in permanent or prolonged impairment of the use of any member or organ of the body]." The definition in this bill deviates from this current uniform jury instruction definition and actually is more limiting than the current definition.

The bill language should use "great bodily injury" (which has the same definition as above) to follow the language used in the crimes of homicide by vehicle and great bodily injury by vehicle found in NMSA 1978, Section 66-8-101.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

No performance implications to DPS.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

No administrative implications to DPS.

This bill is much needed. As the law currently stands, there is no crime for situations when someone is driving a motor vehicle carelessly and kills or causes great bodily injury to someone else. Should an offender kill someone or cause great bodily injury not while driving while under the influence or while driving recklessly, the offender faces the same 90 days of possible jail time and \$500 fine that an offender would have had someone not been killed or injured. This is a huge gap in the law that has desperately needed filling for the victims of these crimes and their families. It further victimizes them to have to tell them that the people who killed or harmed them or their family member are subject to so small of a penalty for the devastation caused and the lives forever changed.
