SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: House Bill 432 would amend the Attendance for Success Act in the Public School Code to provide new penalties for students and parents in cases of excessive absenteeism. Provides for forfeiture of the student's driving privileges for 90 days on first finding and no more than one year for subsequent findings. Creates the petty misdemeanor crime of causing or allowing an excessively absent student to continue to be absent, punishable by a fine or community service for the first offense, and a fine or imprisonment for up to six months, or both, for multiple offenses.

Where an excessively absent student is referred to Juvenile Probation Services, in addition to any other disposition, the Children's Court may order that the student's driving privileges to be suspended for a specified time, up to 90 days for the first finding of excessive absenteeism and no more than one year for a subsequent finding.

It is a violation of the Attendance for Success Act for a parent of an excessively absent student to cause or allow that student to continue to be absent from school. If the absences continue after the student is referred to Juvenile Probation, the local school board or governing body of a charter or private school shall, after consultation with the local superintendent or head administrator, refer the parent to the local District Attorney for prosecution.

If that parent is found to have caused or allowed the excessive absenteeism to continue, the parent is guilty of a petty misdemeanor. For the first conviction the parent shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$100 or may be ordered to perform community service; and for subsequent convictions subject to a fine not to exceed \$500 or up to six months' imprisonment, or both.
