SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> HB 485 enacts the School Marshal Act, which authorizes school districts to employ school marshals who are retired or former certified and commissioned law enforcement officers. The bill defines a "school marshal" as a retired or former certified and commissioned law enforcement officer who was certified and commissioned for no less than three years, left law enforcement in good standing, and is employed by a school district. These individuals must meet specific training and certification requirements developed by the New Mexico Law Enforcement Standards and Training Council.

School marshals are permitted to carry concealed firearms with approval from the local school board and the Public School Insurance Authority. Their role is limited to preventing or stopping offenses that threaten serious bodily injury or death on school premises. Additionally, HB 485 amends existing laws to allow school marshals to carry firearms on school premises and specifies conditions under which their status may be revoked.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

HB 485 does not include a specific appropriation. Any fiscal impact will be related to the costs of training, certification, and ongoing professional development of school marshals. The Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (DHSEM) does not anticipate a direct fiscal impact on its operations. However, it does seem like certain costs will have to be incurred by school districts who implement this program.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

HB 485 presents several considerations regarding school safety and public security. By authorizing school marshals to carry concealed firearms, the bill aims to enhance school safety and provide an additional layer of protection during emergency situations. However, DHSEM has concerns regarding the potential risks associated with arming school personnel, including issues of firearm safety, use-of-force protocols, and the potential for escalation during incidents.

Coordination with local law enforcement is essential to ensure that school marshals operate within established security frameworks. DHSEM recommends consultation with the Department of Public Safety (DPS) to evaluate the program's implications for emergency response, law enforcement coordination, and the legal use of force. Additionally, clear guidelines should be established to define the roles, responsibilities, and limitations of school marshals to prevent conflicts with existing school resource officer programs.
