BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

NMSA 30-7-7.3, as currently written, requires a seven-calendar-day waiting period for the sale of a firearm and the transfer of the firearm to the buyer. Currently, sales of firearms to a federal firearms licensee, a concealed carry license holder, a law enforcement agency, or between certain certified law enforcement officers or between immediate family members are exempt from the waiting period.

HB 565 would add to the exemptions (1) sales to a buyer who is a law enforcement officer authorized to carry a firearm and certified pursuant to federal law or the Law Enforcement Training Act; and (2) sales to a buyer who is a commissioned law enforcement officer who has the power to arrest while performing the officer's official duties.

CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

HB 566 duplicates and subsumes HB 565, in that HB 566 would exempt both new categories as HB 565, and would additionally exempt former or retired law enforcement officers who were authorized to carry a firearm and certified pursuant to federal law or the Law Enforcement Training Act, as well as law enforcement officers of an Indian nation, tribe or pueblo who are authorized to carry a firearm.

HB 566 differs further from HB 565 by specifying that the members of the newly exempted groups must not by action of law be permanently disqualified from possessing a firearm. This provision would remove the exemption, for example, of virtually any former or retired law enforcement officer who was also a felon.

HB 162 and HB 384 are both titled Repeal Firearms Sale Waiting Period and are each sponsored in whole or in part by some of the sponsors of HB 565 and HB 566. If NMSA 30-7-7.3 were repealed, it would not thereafter need to be amended as proposed by either HB 565 or HB 566.
