#### **BILL SUMMARY**

Synopsis: House Joint Memorial 10 proposes to amend the state Constitution to remove a felony conviction as a disqualifier to vote.

Proposal to be submitted to the people at the next general or prior special election.

#### **SIGNIFICANT ISSUES**

Under current New Mexico law, incarcerated felons are not permitted to vote.

This constitutional amendment, combined with a change in statute, could allow felons who are currently incarcerated to vote. This constitutional amendment alone probably won't affect the Corrections Department much, but a statutory change could, depending on whether the drafters of the statute attempt to impose duties on the Corrections Department to facilitate inmate voting or set up polling places in facilities.
