SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: SB 25 enacts a new section of the Criminal Sentencing Act, Section 31-18-12 NMSA 1978 et. seq, to provide a sentencing enhancement of three years when a separate finding of fact by the court or jury shows that fentanyl in the amount of one kilogram or more was sold or trafficked pursuant to Section 30-31-20 or 30-31-21 NMSA 1978.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There will be a minimal administrative cost for statewide update, distribution and documentation of statutory changes. Any additional fiscal impact on the judiciary would be proportional to the enforcement of this law and commenced prosecutions, and appeals from convictions, as well as challenges to the law. New laws, amendments to existing laws and new hearings have the potential to increase caseloads in the courts, thus requiring additional resources to handle the increase.

Increased penalties are likely to result in more defendants invoking their right to trials, as well as to jury trials. More trials and more jury trials will require additional judge time, courtroom staff time, courtroom availability and jury fees. Indigent offenders are entitled to public defender services.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

- 2. Opponents of criminal penalties being instituted or enhanced or stiffened for illegal production, possession or distribution of fentanyl, including some public health officials, have warned of potential consequences such as worsening the opioid crisis and pushing users toward more dangerous synthetic alternatives, as suppliers seek to evade law enforcement scrutiny. Some criminal justice advocates say fentanyl should be treated as a public health issue rather than a law enforcement problem.
