SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

The bill creates a new crime of having or transporting a weapon that one knows, or has reason to know, is stolen. The firearm is not only an operable one, but also one that could be made operable. There's an exception if one is returning it to the owner, or turning it in to a buyback program. The offense would be a fourth degree felony. A felon in possession of a stolen firearm could not be charged with both this new offense and the crime of being a felon in possession of a firearm under state law.

<u>Synopsis:</u> Creates a fourth degree felony crime of possessing a stolen firearm.

This law would reduce the potential penalties in the case of a more expensive weapon.

HB 83 would allow permitless firearm carry for lawful gun ownership. This bill would need to be reconciled with the intent and language of that bill's reference to lawful ownership/possession.

WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

Depending upon circumstances, the prohibited conduct would be punished as either larceny or carrying a deadly weapon. Larceny offenses are graded by the value of the stolen item, with thefts of higher valued items punished as higher levels of felony.
