1. BILL SUMMARY

a) Synopsis

Senate Bill 104 (HB104) proposes to facilitate interstate practice of occupational therapy with the goal of improving public access to audiology and speech-language pathology services. Objectives include: increase public access to occupational therapy services by providing for the mutual recognition of other member state licenses; enhance the states' ability to protect public health and safety; encourage the cooperation of member states in regulating multistate audiology and speech-language pathology services; support spouses of relocating military members; enhance the exchange of licensure, investigative and disciplinary information between member states; and allow a remote state to hold a provider of services with a compact privilege in that state accountable to that state's practice standards; and facilitate the use of telehealth technology in order to increase access to audiology and speech-language pathology services.
