SECTION III: NARRATIVE

This analysis is neither a formal Opinion nor an Advisory Letter issued by the New Mexico Department of Justice. This is a staff analysis in response to a committee or legislator's request. The analysis does not represent any official policy or legal position of the NM Department of Justice.

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

Senate Bill 114 ("SB114") proposes amendments and new language to be added to NMSA 1978, Section 17-4-1 POWER TO ACQUIRE LAND, that sets out a statutory change to the process for the Game Commission to acquire land. The bill adds language under NMSA 1978, Section 17-1-14 and Section 17-2-44 that requires the Game Commission and its director to be "subject to the procedural requirements of 17-4-1 NMSA 1978."

SB114 proposes additional requirements and procedure for the acquisition of land. First, the Game Commission shall (1) obtain written approval of an acequia association, a land grant, and the board of county commissioners of the county in which the property or water rights sought are located; (2) examine and compile a report on the social, cultural and economic impacts to the acequia association, land grant or county in which the acquisition is located; and (3) obtain the approval of the legislature for the acquisition.

SB114 also proposes language that requires the Game Commission to report to the legislature funds spent to acquire lands and future funds needed.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

SB114 could potentially impose a burden on land grants, associations, and counties to provide written approval. As proposed, the Game Commission would likely need to provide rules on what that process would look like and what would be satisfactory for a letter of approval.

SB114 requires legislative approval for each acquisition. This would be a departure from many other acquisition requirements either set out in New Mexico procurement code or other statutory schemes. For example, the Game Commission's statutes require New Mexico State Board of Finance approval for the transfer of capital outlay funds. Presumably, it would be much easier for the Game Commission to acquire State Board of Finance approval for such acquisitions of property. Unlike the legislature, which meets once per year, the State Board of Finance meets monthly. Further, the State Board of Finance already reviews many state acquisitions of property
