This analysis is neither a formal Opinion nor an Advisory Letter issued by the New Mexico Department of Justice. This is a staff analysis in response to a committee or legislator's request. The analysis does not represent any official policy or legal position of the NM Department of Justice.

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

The bill creates the Natural Disaster Loan Program allowing the Department of Finance to provide zero-interest reimbursable loans to political subdivisions of the state provided they have been approved for federal public assistance funding during a federally declared emergency. It does so by creating a "Natural Disaster Revolving Fund" for the purpose of providing loans to political subdivisions and amending the Appropriation Contingency Fund, § 6-4-2.3 NMSA 1978 to reference the Disaster Location Act § 12-11-23. The bill also explicitly defines what constitutes New Mexico State Reserves to include the new revolving fund.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

None for the NMDOJ.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The bill allows for but does not require consultation with the Homeland Security and Emergency Management Departments. This bill may require courts to interpret the scope of Homeland Security and the Emergency Management Departments' roles.

Additionally, this bill adds new material explicitly defining "State Reserves." "State Reserves" are defined as consisting of the "(A) appropriation contingency fund; (B) general fund operating reserve; (C) government results and opportunity expendable trust; (D) state-support reserve fund; (E) tax stabilization reserve; and (F) natural disaster revolving fund."

Section 5. This enumerated list of funds may preclude future funds from being used as state reserves.

CONFLICT, DUPLICATION, COMPANIONSHIP, RELATIONSHIP

This bill amends § 6-4-2.3 NMSA 1978, the "Appropriation Contingency Fund," to reference the 'Disaster Location Act" § 12-11-23 to -25 NMSA 1978, instead of §§ 6-7-1 to -3, which were recompiled to §§12-11-23 to -25 in 2005. This effectively updates the reference in the appropriation contingency fund.

Additionally, this bill removes references to appropriations that took place in the seventy-ninth and eightieth fiscal years. The removal of this language does not conflict with current law.
