BILL SUMMARY

This bill will make cyberbullying a crime consisting of a person communicating directly or indirectly in writing or electronically with a public or private school student with "reckless disregard" to the harm it causes a student.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

DPS strongly supports this bill. It aims to protect students from the devastating effects of cyberbullying while ensuring clear legal consequences for those responsible. It addresses the various ways in which cyberbullying can harm students, from emotional distress to physical harm, and offers a tiered penalty system that escalates based on the severity of the harm inflicted.

Currently, law enforcement officers face challenges when trying to address cyberbullying incidents because the law has not caught up with technological advances, requiring them to use legal framework that may not completely fit or is vague. By making cyberbullying a criminal act, this bill would give the DPS and other law enforcement agencies a clear, enforceable statute to address these offenses, which would streamline investigations and prosecutions. Furthermore, it would create greater opportunities to hold offenders accountable.

The bill aligns with the DPS's mission to safeguard public welfare, particularly with respect to the youth in New Mexico.
