SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> This bill amends the Wireless Consumer Advanced Infrastructure Act to expand the definition of "authority" beyond municipalities and counties to include all political subdivisions of the State and State agencies.

It also updates the definition of Right of Way to align with Right of Way definitions found in other areas of law.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

There is no fiscal impact with this bill as it simply expands the discretionary authority of state entities to authorize collocation of a small wireless facility on their property or under their right of way.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

As discussed in the Broadband Strategic Plan, the Office of Broadband Access and Expansion (OBAE) hopes to foster universal availability of mobile voice and broadband coverage across rural communities and roadways.

OBAE's strategy includes first identifying coverage holes and gaps in rural communities and public safety networks.

However, New Mexico faces a significant shortfall in achieving universal broad availability. Prior analysis from OBAE estimates New Mexico requires an additional \$3.16 billion in additional capital investment to provide connectivity to all locations.

This bill will enable state agencies and other political subdivisions of the state to partner with OBAE in filling the 5G gap at no cost to the State.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

This amendment will allow state agencies to address the statewide gaps in 5G availability.

For example, the Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources Department would have the discretion to authorize a small wireless facility in State Parks, thus expanding 5G availability in extremely rural areas. Such an expansion of 5G would increase the safety and enjoyment of park visitors.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

This bill would allow State entities to permit collocation of a small wireless facility as they may find appropriate to address wireless needs in their communities.
