## **SECTION III: NARRATIVE**

#### **BILL SUMMARY**

Synopsis: SB206 amends the state procurement code to raise the minimum amounts for certain local and state public works projects. The bill requires agencies to submit two names for Chief Procurement Officer certification and increases exemption limits for certain purchases. It also introduces exemptions for information technology services, capital equipment, and software contracts. SB206 raises the small purchase limits that are excluded from central purchasing agencies with certified procurement officers and allows these contracts to extend beyond one year. Additionally, SB206 changes the requirements for posting and publishing invitations to bid and modifies expenditure thresholds. It mandates that professional service contracts be reviewed by the State Purchasing Agent or a designee from the General Services Department. The bill also increases the purchase limits for certain transactions managed by the Central Purchasing Agent, enabling state agencies or local public bodies to issue certain direct purchase orders, and allows professional service contracts to last up to eight years.

#### FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

No fiscal impact on EMNRD.

#### **SIGNIFICANT ISSUES**

SB206 increases the purchase limits for certain items, which reduces the workload involved in generating purchase orders and speeds up the state government's purchasing process. However, some exemptions in SB206 do not address essential operational costs that the Energy, Minerals, and Natural Resources Department (EMNRD) must still bid on before making purchases. These include services like sewer pumping, internet services, and propane, which, though considered utilities in modern terms, are not classified as publicly regulated utilities. SB206 exempts only publicly regulated or publicly provided utilities, meaning it doesn't ease the procurement bid process currently handled by EMNRD's purchasing staff. Additionally, EMNRD State Parks operates the Living Desert Zoo, which requires park staff to seek multiple bids for zoo supplies and animal feed. Since these items are not covered by the procurement exemptions, managing the zoo becomes more challenging.

## PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

#### ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

Adding additional language to certain exemption codes within the bill allow EMNRD to improve the procurement processes for specific required operational costs. Without the added language EMNRD will continue to be task with cumbersome bidding process for purchases that are required

to ensure public safety and health for all customers who EMNRD provides services to.

## WHAT WILL BE THE CONSEQUENCES OF NOT ENACTING THIS BILL

The state government's purchasing process will become more cumbersome due to inflation, as the dollar thresholds for goods and services have not kept pace with rising costs. As a result, agencies will be required to process more Requests for Proposals (RFPs), which will slow down the procurement of general operational purchases.
