SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: The bill amends Section 9-27-6 NMSA related to the role of approving information technology procurement and projects by state agencies.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Additional funding will be required for salary and benefits for 1 (one) FTE to support the activities previously conducted by the Department of Information Technology. The SPD IT Procurement Specialists II are a pay band eighty-five with the max salary of \$120,000. State Purchasing does not receive general fund; budget authority is required to use revenue collected by the Division.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The Department of Information Technology (DoIT) will continue to review and approve information technology projects. State Purchasing will be responsible for approving contracts and amendments to contracts, including emergency procurements, sole source contracts and price agreements

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

The bill removes procurement roles from the DoIT and transfers the responsibility to the State Purchasing Division. DoIT will be responsible for approving the scope of work submitted by agencies. Once approved, agencies will submit procurement documents to State Purchasing for approval.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

This process is expected to streamline the procurement process for information technology procurements. The consolidation of information technology procurement within the State Purchasing Division centralizes procurement and eliminates redundancies, boosts accountability streamlines and simplified processes. This bill will allow for all procurement to be housed in one agency and allows DoIT to focus on projects.
