SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> Regulates the sale of beneficial substances (which are beneficial to plants, soil, or media; excludes pesticides and fertilizer) in the state through required labeling, registration, inspections, penalties, and reporting. Provides exemptions and preempts local regulation. The bill states on p. 5, line 18, that the Beneficial Substances Act shall be administered solely by the "board" through the "department," meaning that primary responsibility for administering the act is solely on the NMSU Board of Regents rather than the Department of Agriculture. Likewise, the Board of Regents is given rulemaking authority over the Act. Other major policy authority is given to the Department of Agriculture.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The current wording of the bill implicitly adds a new exemption from hazardous waste regulations under beneficial use provisions, adding confusion to the regulatory authority of the New Mexico Environment Department (NMED) and its regulatory authority of hazardous waste. To prevent this, NMED recommends adding to the section on benefical substance "adulteration" to specify that a beneficial substance cannot have hazardous waste as a component.

NMED periodically encounters businesses that attempt to pass off hazardous wastes as "products." NMED recommends one addition in the new 76-11A-12 on p. 14 to address this concern, as provided in the amendments section below.

This bill's revised exemption in the amendment mirrors the exemption in the NMED's hazardous waste regulations, but in contrast provides the authority to NMDA to either address, or refer to NMED, any instance where hazardous wastes are included in a soil amendment material, and prevents anyone from using the uncorrected language in this bill to say they are otherwise exempt and okay to adulterate beneficial substances in lieu of properly disposing of such wastes. This is a concern because the language in 76-11A-12(A) only states "in sufficient amount", providing a loophole for a business to dilute their hazardous waste and deem it an ingredient of a beneficial substance.

AMENDMENTS

Recommend adding 76-11A-12(D) to read: "It contains any hazardous wastes, as defined in 74-4-3(K), that are not themselves equivalent in composition to a beneficial substance". This would be added to the list of conditions under which NMDA would consider a beneficial substance "adulterated".
