SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Senate Bill 341 introduces a new section to Chapter 31, Article 20A of the New Mexico Statutes Annotated (NMSA) permitting the imposition of the death penalty for individuals convicted of specific offenses. These offenses include the intentional or willful neglect or abuse resulting in the death of a child, the death of a child caused during the commission of a felony under the Controlled Substances Act, and the death of a law enforcement officer or any acts related to the death of a law enforcement officer.

While mitigating circumstances may be considered, the sentence cannot be reduced below life imprisonment without the possibility of parole. Aggravating factors may include, but are not limited to, prior convictions for child neglect or abuse, previous intervention by the Children, Youth, and Families Department (CYFD), failure to comply with CYFD plans or commitments, the severity of a child's suffering, the age of the child, a history of violent criminal behavior, killing multiple victims, endangerment to public safety, and affiliation with criminal organizations such as gangs or cartels.

All cases involving the death penalty will undergo automatic review by the New Mexico Supreme Court to ensure that proper legal procedures are followed and that the conviction is free from procedural errors.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

This bill introduces the possibility that law enforcement agencies may request access to records related to families with whom the Children, Youth, and Families Department (CYFD) has worked, including the plans developed for those families. In anticipation of such requests, it is imperative that CYFD maintains accurate and comprehensive records to ensure that, should law enforcement seek this information for the purpose of pursuing the death penalty, the department

can provide the necessary documentation in a timely and thorough manner.
