SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

<u>Synopsis:</u> The Bill proposes strengthening privacy protections for patient records by requiring the segregation of certain health care information, prohibiting the disclosure of certain health care information, and Repealing Section 24-14-18 NMSA 1978 (Being Laws 1977, Chapter 206, Section 2, as amended) which requires the reporting of induced abortion. The effective date is July 1, 2025.

This Bill expands privacy protection for patient records. The key provisions are:

- Requires electronic health record systems and health information exchanges to segregate and limit access to sensitive health care information.
- Prohibits the disclosure of certain health care information.
- Repeals a previous law requiring the reporting of induced abortions.
- Includes reproductive health care, gender-affirming health care, mental health care, and substance use treatment.
- Establishes civil penalties for intentional violations and allows individuals to sue for damages.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The fiscal impact of NM SB404 on the New Mexico Retiree Health Care Authority (NMRHCA) is expected to be minimal. The Bill primarily focuses on enhancing privacy protections on data for patient records and health care claims, which may require some adjustments to comply with the new proposed requirements related to electronic health care data.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

More information will be required to better understand the requirement of the segregating data for specific healthcare information once the Health Care Authority determines it to be compliant.

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPLICATIONS

Current policies and procedures maintained by the agency with insurers and those with access to such information will be required to update systems and administration of private information for items noted in the Bill. Strict guidelines are currently placed due to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, which requires the agency to follow electronic data interchange procedures and maintain the privacy and security of all electronic, written, or oral information.
