BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis:

SB427- Appropriates \$60 million (GF) to the Health Care Authority for use in FYs 2026 through 2028 to create new physician residency programs and positions.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

Residency/training licenses will increase leading to a minimal amount of increased work by agency licensing and investigative staff.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

The New Mexico Medical Board fully endorses the expansion of residency programs across the state as a vital strategy to address the growing need for qualified, licensed physicians. By increasing residency opportunities, NM can strengthen our healthcare workforce, enhance access to quality care for all New Mexicans, and support the professional development of future physicians. Expanding these programs is essential to meeting the healthcare needs of our diverse communities and ensuring a healthier future for our state. Physician post-graduate residency programs in NM must be required to meet ACGME accreditation in order to ensure standards for education are met and to ensure graduating residents are prepared and eligible for NMMB licensure, specialty board certification and employer credentialing requirements.

Other states are increasing residency programs in prefer to attract newly graduated physicians to their state. Many physicians remain in the state in which they trained during residency, especially if there is a service requirement. Not enacting this bill will keep the number of resident physicians in NM stagnant and may lead to less practicing physicians in NM over time.
