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HOUSE BILL 231

AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION; PROVIDING FOR ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. A new section of the Public School Code is enacted to read:

"[NEW MATERIAL] SHORT TITLE. -- This act may be cited as the "Elementary and Secondary School Scholarship Act"."

Section 2. A new section of the Public School Code is enacted to read:

"[NEW MATERIAL] LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS AND PURPOSE. --

- A. The legislature finds that:
- (1) every family in New Mexico should have the option to take advantage of the best educational opportunities available to their school-age children;

(2) providing families in New Mexico a choice
between schools leads to competition that benefits students
and improves the quality of public schools;
(3) students should be allowed to improve

- (3) students should be allowed to improve their learning potential through educational opportunities that are best suited to their individual needs and interests; and
- (4) a family of a low economic status should not be denied educational choices for their school-age children.
- B. The purpose of the Elementary and Secondary School Scholarship Act is to establish a scholarship program that provides New Mexico's students the opportunity to attend private schools."
- Section 3. A new section of the Public School Code is enacted to read:

"[NEW MATERIAL] DEFINITIONS. -- As used in the Elementary and Secondary School Scholarship Act:

- A. "family income" means the income of a student's parent or legal guardian who resides with the student at the student's principal residence;
- B. "federal poverty guidelines" means the level of income defining poverty by family size published annually in the federal register by the United States department of health and human services;

4	D. "program" means the elementary and secondary

6	Section 4. A new section of the Public School Code is

8	"[NEW MATERIAL] ADMINISTRATION OF THE PROGRAM - ADOPTING

10	A. The department of education shall establish and
11	bear the cost of administering the elementary and secondary

21	Section 5. A new section of the Public School Code is
22	enacted to read:
23	"[NEW MATERIAL] ELIGIBLE STUDENTS
24	A. A student who is a resident of New Mexico and
25	is at least five years of age prior to 12:01 a.m. September 1

of the school year or is a developmentally disabled three- or four-year-old child is eligible to participate in the program if his family meets the following criteria:

- (1) for the 1998-99 school year, the student's family income in 1997 does not exceed one hundred eighty-five percent of the 1997 federal poverty guidelines;
- (2) for the 1999-00 school year, the student's family income in 1998 does not exceed two hundred thirty-five percent of the 1998 federal poverty guidelines; and
- (3) for the 2000-01 school year, the student's family income in 1999 does not exceed three hundred percent of the 1999 federal poverty guidelines.
- B. For the 2001-02 school year and subsequent years, all students shall be eligible to participate in the program."

Section 6. A new section of the Public School Code is enacted to read:

"[NEW MATERIAL] ELIGIBLE PRIVATE SCHOOLS. --

A. If a private school has existed for two school years or more, it is eligible to participate in the program if it is accredited by the state board, association of Christian schools international, independent schools association of the southwest, international Christian accrediting association, New Mexico north central association, southwestern association . 120563. 2

of Episcopal schools, national association for education of young children, Navajo north central association or other educational accrediting body approved by the state board.

- B. If a private school has existed for fewer than two school years, it is eligible to participate if it applies for accreditation by the state board, association of Christian schools international, independent schools association of the southwest, international Christian accrediting association, New Mexico north central association, southwestern association of Episcopal schools, national association for education of young children, Navajo north central association or other educational accrediting body approved by the state board and the anticipated date of accreditation is not later than the end of the second school year during which the private school has accepted scholarship students.
- C. To be eligible to participate in the program, a private school shall:
- (1) register with the superintendent of a local school district as an eligible private school;
- (2) develop anti-discrimination policies to prevent discrimination on the basis of race, age, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, physical or mental handicap or serious medical condition; and
- (3) develop policies that do not discriminate against students who are recipients of elementary and

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secondary school scholarships.

D. A private school that accepts students that are participants in the program shall not be required to comply with rules that apply to public schools promulgated by either the state board or the local school board."

Section 7. A new section of the Public School Code is enacted to read:

"[NEW MATERIAL] PROCEDURES FOR USING SCHOLARSHIP NOTES. --

A. Not earlier than March 1 and not later than
July 1 prior to the beginning of a school year, a student's
parent or legal guardian may apply to the state superintendent
to participate in the program. The state superintendent may
waive the application deadline. The application shall contain
the following information:

- (1) the student's name and address;
- (2) the student's date of birth:
- (3) the student's social security number;
- (4) the student's school attendance zone:
- (5) the student's grade level;
- (6) the name and address of the student's parent or legal guardian who is residing with the child;
- (7) copies of the student's parent or legal guardian's three most recent paycheck receipts for all employment or a signed statement by the parent or legal guardian's employer indicating his weekly, biweekly or annual . 120563. 2

gross earnings for a parent or legal guardian who resides with the student at the student's principal residence;

- (8) whether the student was enrolled in a class A, B, C or D special education program in the prior school year or, for a child entering school for the first time, whether the child has a diagnosed developmental disability or learning disorder;
- (9) whether the student speaks a language other than English as his principal language; and
- (10) the name, tuition, fees and address of the private school to which the student intends to apply.
- B. No later than forty-five days after the application is received, the state superintendent shall act on the application, notify the parent or legal guardian of the value of the scholarship note and issue the scholarship note if the application is approved.
- C. The scholarship note shall be issued to the student in the care of the student's parent or legal guardian. The scholarship note shall not be issued to the private school that the student chooses to attend.
- D. The student and his parent or legal guardian shall solely select the private school the student chooses to attend. The state shall not decide which private school a student may attend. The state shall not advise or influence the student's selection of a private school.

E. Not later than August 15 of each year, the state superintendent shall report to the school districts the ages, school attendance zones and scholarship values of students participating in the program."

Section 8. A new section of the Public School Code is enacted to read:

"[NEW MATERIAL] SCHOLARSHIP NOTES--REDEMPTION. --

- A. The value of the scholarship note shall be equal to the amount of money generated by the student through the equalization formula if the student had attended a public school in his school attendance zone, excluding any size adjustment for the school district or the public school. The department of education shall calculate the value of a student's scholarship note using the equalization formula set out in the Public School Finance Act.
- B. The scholarship note redemption value shall not exceed the tuition and fees charged by a private school for students not participating in the program.
- C. Within fifteen days after receiving a scholarship note, a private school shall certify enrollment of the student named on the scholarship note and shall certify the amount of tuition and fees charged by the private school to the department of education.
- D. A private school shall redeem the value of the scholarship note from the department of education in monthly . 120563. 2

installments equal to one-ninth the value defined in Subsection A of this section. The monthly installments shall begin on the first day of the first month of the school year.

- E. If a private school disenrolls a student during the school year or if the student is absent for ten consecutive days without explanation from his parent or legal guardian, the private school shall notify the department of education and the monthly scholarship redemption shall cease.
- F. If a parent or legal guardian disenrolls a student from a private school and enrolls the student in another private school or in a public school during the school year, the parent or legal guardian shall notify the department of education. Upon receipt of proof of enrollment in another private school and certification of tuition and fees charged by the new private school, the remaining scholarship redemption installments shall be made to the new private school. Upon proof of enrollment in a public school, the remaining redemption installments shall be made to the school district in which the public school is located.
- G. The school district in which a student's attendance zone is located shall not bear the costs of transportation, room, board, instructional materials, equipment, educational technology or any other costs of attending a private school except for the amount of the scholarship note."
