RELATING TO THE ENVIRONMENT; ESTABLISHING AN OFFICE OF
CHILDREN'S ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION; CREATING A TEMPORARY TASK
FORCE ON ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH RISKS AND SAFETY RISKS TO
CHILDREN; PROVIDING POWERS AND DUTIES; MAKING AN
APPROPRIATION; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. [NEW MATERIAL] FINDINGS.--The legislature finds that a growing body of scientific knowledge demonstrates that children suffer disproportionately from environmental health risks and safety risks. These risks arise in part because children's neurological, immunological, digestive and other bodily systems are still developing. The legislature finds that it is important to address these risks and to assure New Mexico families that the state is concerned about

protecting their children's environment.

Section 2. A new section of the Department of Environment Act is enacted to read:

"[NEW MATERIAL] OFFICE OF CHILDREN'S ENVIRONMENTAL

PROTECTION--DUTIES.--The "office of children's environmental

protection" is created as a division within the department of
environment. The office shall:

- A. identify and assess environmental health risks and safety risks that may disproportionately affect children;
- B. develop policies, programs, activities and standards that address disproportionate risks to children that result from environmental health risks or safety risks;
- C. disseminate information about and policies and programs to address environmental health risks and safety risks to schools and other agencies and entities with programs or facilities for children;
- D. work with the superintendent of public instruction and the state board of education to carry out a program to measure electric and magnetic fields in public schools and private schools and daycare centers that receive federal or state funds to establish guidelines for reducing electric and magnetic field levels as outlined in the electric and magnetic field checklist for school buildings and grounds construction, a study funded by the United States department of energy;

	F. require each state agency to review its		
	policies, programs, activities and standards, in accordance		

- F. require each state agency to review its policies, programs, activities and standards, in accordance with guidelines set by the office, to ensure that none involve disproportionate health risks or safety risks to children;
- G. coordinate the efforts of all state agencies dealing with children's environmental health risks and safety risks; and
- H. establish liaisons with appropriate federal, local, tribal, private and nonprofit offices and agencies addressing children's environmental health risks and safety risks."

Section 3. TEMPORARY PROVISION--TASK FORCE ON

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH RISKS AND SAFETY RISKS TO CHILDREN-
MEMBERSHIP--DUTIES.--

A. The "task force on environmental health risks and safety risks to children" is created for the period from the effective date of this act until December 1, 1999. The task force shall consist of the lieutenant governor; the secretary of environment; the secretary of health; the secretary of children, youth and families; the superintendent

of regulation and licensing; the superintendent of public instruction; the secretary of energy, minerals and natural resources; the attorney general or his designee and six persons appointed to serve as children's ombudsmen. One children's ombudsman shall be appointed by the governor, one by the New Mexico supreme court, one by the speaker of the house of representatives, one by the minority leader of the house of representatives, one by the president pro tempore of the senate and one by the minority leader of the senate.

- B. The lieutenant governor shall serve as chairman of the task force and shall convene the task force within ten days of the effective date of this act.
- C. The task force shall have the power to subpoena an individual, commission, council, agency, department or any other entity to appear in person or to produce documents under their control for the purpose of obtaining information relevant to its mission.
- D. The task force shall make recommendations to the secretary of environment on organizing and operating the office of children's environmental protection in the most appropriate and effective way to carry out its mission. The task force shall ensure that the office of children's environmental protection is established immediately and can begin as soon as possible to initiate the program to measure electric and magnetic fields in the public schools.

Section 4. APPROPRIATION. -- One million dollars

(\$1,000,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the department of environment for expenditure in fiscal years 1998 and 1999 to establish and operate the office of children's environmental protection and carry out the provisions of this act. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the end of fiscal year 1999 shall revert to the general fund.

Section 5. EMERGENCY.--It is necessary for the public peace, health and safety that this act take effect immediately.

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
