A JOINT MEMORIAL

REQUESTING THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC EDUCATION TO OUTLINE
A STATEWIDE PROGRAM USING "MULTIPLE INTELLIGENCES" TEACHING
STRATEGIES AND INTERACTIVE TECHNOLOGY, INCLUDING COLLABORATION
BETWEEN PUBLIC SCHOOLS, NATIONAL LABORATORIES, STATE RESEARCH
INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER LEARNING AND OTHER NONPROFIT
INSTITUTIONS ENGAGED IN SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH OR TECHNOLOGY
TRANSFER AND TO CULTIVATE ALTERNATIVE SOURCES FOR FUNDING AND
SUPPORT OF ACADEMIC AND STUDENT SKILL PERFORMANCE COMPETITIONS
IN SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY FOR PUBLIC SCHOOL STUDENTS.

WHEREAS, the Pojoaque high school robotics team placed second in the world at the international B.E.A.M. robotic games and the Quanta international games for science and technology held at the City of Montessori college in Lucknow, India in November 1997; and

WHEREAS, students who were enrolled in a special alternative learning class funded by a nonfunding formula grant excelled in their efforts and won a prestigious international academic award; and

WHEREAS, the special alternative learning class helped the students develop their abilities, and the students responded by applying their mechanical and electronic skills to solar robotics and excelled by distinguishing themselves and New Mexico in an international competition; and

WHEREAS, the students and their parents had to struggle to raise the needed money to attend the international competition, and school mates and businesses contributed to raising the funds necessary for their attendance; and

WHEREAS, as a result of this effort, the team members have made the honor roll at Pojoaque high school, and the experience demonstrates the exceptional value of these competitions; and

WHEREAS, the fields of science and math have contributed greatly to the economy and general welfare of the state of New Mexico, and the state desires to promote and encourage these fields and their related industries in the state and the skills involving critical thinking, problem solving, invention and creation that will prepare our children and our state for the future;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE
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STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the state department of public education be directed to outline a statewide program, including a cost-benefit analysis of sustained collaboration between public schools, national laboratories such as the Los Alamos and Sandia national laboratories, New Mexico research institutions of higher learning and other nonprofit institutions engaged in scientific research or technology transfer; that the statewide program be composed of geographically representative regions throughout the state; that a central coordinating point be established in the department to coordinate the activities between the schools and the research institutions; that the department develop with the collaborators a statewide, public performance, project-oriented skill demonstration "challenge competition" system similar to the "Supercomputing Challenge" sponsored by Los Alamos national laboratory and the robotic challenge competition participated in by Pojoaque high school and that the system be constructed to plug into existing national and global academic challenge systems such as B. E. A. M; that the department explore and cultivate alternative sources of funding and support for academic and skill performance competitions in science and technology so that New Mexico students can participate in more prestigious competitions such as the robotics event in India, and therefore be encouraged, as were the Pojoaque high school students, to excel and

distinguish themselves; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the state department of public education deliver its plan and recommendations to the legislative education study committee no later than August 20, 1998 for considered implementation during the 1999 legislative session; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the superintendent of public instruction and the director of the legislative education study committee.
