AN ACT

RELATING TO INFORMATION SYSTEMS; CREATING THE INFORMATION SYSTEMS MANAGEMENT COMMISSION; PROVIDING POWERS AND DUTIES; REQUIRING ANNUAL PLANNING FOR STATE-FUNDED INFORMATION SYSTEMS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. SHORT TITLE.--This act may be cited as the "Information Systems Management Act".

Section 2. PURPOSE.--The purpose of the Information Systems Management Act is to coordinate the central and individual executive agency information systems in a manner that ensures that the most cost-effective and efficient information and communication systems and resources are being used by executive agencies. Coordination will be achieved through the development of a five-year strategic plan for

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1 information and communication management that is developed and
2 updated annually by the information systems management
3 commission. The plan shall include an inventory of current
4 services, resources and systems.

5 Section 3. DEFINITIONS. -- As used in the Information
6 Systems Management Act:

7 A. "commission" means the information systems
8 management commission;

9 B. "executive agency" means a state agency that is
10 not part of the judicial or legislative branch of government,
11 a state educational institution or local political
12 subdivision; and

13 C. "information system" means computer and voice
14 and data communication software and hardware, including
15 imaging systems, terminals and communications networks and
16 facilities, staff information systems services and
17 professional service contracts for information systems
18 services.

19 Section 4. COMMISSION CREATED-- COMPOSITION-- STAFF. --

20 A. The "information systems management commission"
21 is created. The commission consists of the secretaries of
22 finance and administration and general services or their
23 designees and six members appointed by the governor as
24 follows:

- 25 (1) two representatives from the major

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1 information and communication units of Los Alamos national
2 laboratory and Sandia national laboratories;

3 (2) two cabinet secretaries or their
4 designees, one of whom represents a large information systems
5 user in the state mainframe environment and one of whom
6 represents a medium or small information systems user in a
7 non-mainframe environment, who shall serve on a rotating basis
8 for terms not to exceed two years; and

9 (3) two public members with experience in
10 information systems technology and management, but who are not
11 employees of the state or any of its political subdivisions
12 and who do not have any financial interest in state
13 information systems or state contracts.

14 B. Laboratory representatives and public members
15 shall serve five-year terms, and vacancies shall be filled by
16 appointment by the governor for the unexpired term. Members
17 who are not paid from state funds may be reimbursed for per
18 diem and travel expenses as provided in the Per Diem and
19 Mileage Act.

20 C. Executive agencies represented on the
21 commission shall provide staff for their respective members of
22 the commission.

23 D. The governor shall appoint, with the advice and
24 consent of the senate, a "chief information officer", who
25 shall serve as chairman of the commission and act as the

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1 director of the commission's permanent staff. In addition,
2 the commission may employ the following permanent staff:

3 (1) a deputy director;

4 (2) three information and communication
5 management analysts with responsibilities for a certain set of
6 assigned agencies, agency plans and emerging technologies;

7 (3) two performance auditors to conduct
8 performance audits of all executive agency information
9 management and technology resources; and

10 (4) support staff.

11 Section 5. POWERS AND DUTIES. --

12 A. The commission shall develop and update
13 annually a detailed five-year strategic plan on information
14 systems management to be presented to the governor and the
15 legislative finance committee. The plan shall include the
16 development of policies, standards and procedures for the
17 management of information and communication technology for all
18 executive agencies. The annual updates of the plan shall
19 reflect how the individual agency plans conform to and support
20 the five-year strategic plan.

21 B. The first strategic plan developed under the
22 provisions of the Information Systems Management Act shall
23 provide the framework from which to develop, analyze and
24 approve individual executive agency information systems
25 management plans and resource allocations. The strategic plan

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1 shall define the strategic policy direction for executive
2 agencies and the responsibilities of those agencies in the
3 acquisition and use of information systems and technologies.

4 C. In carrying out its duties pursuant to
5 Subsection A of this section, the commission shall:

6 (1) coordinate the preparation and facilitate
7 the implementation of executive agency plans;

8 (2) review and approve such plans and
9 document the approval to the governor and legislature;

10 (3) monitor information systems development
11 and conduct performance audits of information systems and
12 management and technological resources;

13 (4) advise the governor and legislature on
14 information management and technology matters;

15 (5) develop a strategic information systems
16 management annual plan review policy and process that requires
17 each executive agency to develop an acceptable information
18 systems management annual plan no later than September 1 of
19 each year for review and approval by the commission no later
20 than November 15 of each year to ensure appropriate input into
21 the executive and legislative budget processes;

22 (6) review and evaluate the agency plans
23 against a specific set of criteria set forth in Section 6 of
24 the Information Systems Management Act;

25 (7) review and approve all rate structures

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1 for information systems services in the review and evaluation
2 of the plan for the general services department; provided,
3 however, that the approval authority shall provide the
4 secretary of general services flexibility in rate designs for
5 a variation of plus or minus five percent without commission
6 approval;

7 (8) approve the acquisition of information
8 services, resources and systems, including services relating
9 to project or contract management, to ensure compliance with
10 the Procurement Code and the five-year strategic plan;

11 (9) develop a schedule for ongoing monitoring
12 of major system development projects with a written report
13 that shall be sent to the head of the agency as specified in
14 the schedule and to the legislative finance committee and
15 shall specify compliance with information architecture and
16 audit guidelines, provide recommendations for improved
17 compliance and provide agency recommendations;

18 (10) review all budget requests for
19 appropriations for information and communications systems for
20 all executive agencies for each fiscal year, and for each
21 request the commission shall designate a priority based on the
22 five-year strategic plan, which priority listing shall be
23 furnished to:

24 (a) the department of finance and
25 administration;

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1 (b) the legislative finance committee;
2 and

3 (c) each submitting agency; and

4 (11) make written recommendations to the
5 department of finance and administration and the legislative
6 finance committee for information and communication systems-
7 related budget adjustment requests.

8 Section 6. POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMISSION AND EXECUTIVE
9 AGENCIES PURSUANT TO DEVELOPMENT OF AGENCY PLANS. --

10 A. The commission shall ensure, through the
11 development of specific policies, procedures and guidelines,
12 that agency plans include strategic and operational
13 assessments; provide a formal linkage between information
14 systems management planning and department strategies and
15 processes; use standard formats when appropriate; allow for
16 stratification of projects to require less detail for smaller
17 projects and an increasingly detailed level of analysis and
18 justification as project size, cost and risk increase; and
19 have an increased and enhanced emphasis on evaluation of the
20 economics of all information and communication systems
21 investments.

22 B. The commission shall specifically ensure the
23 following:

24 (1) that the plan is the product of a
25 continuous institutional process;

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1 (2) that the primary responsibility for
2 general supervision of information systems management resides
3 within each department;

4 (3) that each executive agency demonstrates
5 that its information technology planning process is closely
6 linked to its agency strategic planning process and to its
7 program planning activities;

8 (4) that rigorous management processes are
9 applied to ensure that implementation of information systems
10 and resources represents an investment for the state that
11 yields specific, measurable services and financial objectives;

12 (5) that efficient and judicious
13 incorporation of information system technology innovations
14 supports executive agency operations to control expenses,
15 increase productivity, improve service and improve controls;
16 and

17 (6) that the requirement for prudent risk
18 management practices preserves the integrity and security of
19 information and information system facilities and ensures
20 timely resumption of operations following a disaster.

21 C. The commission shall require each executive
22 agency's plan to include the following:

23 (1) an executive agency overview;
24 (2) a summary of the agency's existing
25 information and communications hardware and software resources

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- 1 and network connectivity;
- 2 (3) a strategic information systems plan,
- 3 including cost and benefit analyses;
- 4 (4) a tactical information systems plan,
- 5 including specific budget data;
- 6 (5) a method for revising and reporting on
- 7 the plan;
- 8 (6) the requirement for a feasibility study
- 9 to be included in the plan for all projects with a total cost
- 10 equal to or greater than five hundred thousand dollars
- 11 (\$500,000) or for any ongoing project the scope of which will
- 12 exceed five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) as well as
- 13 include a detailed assessment of project management
- 14 methodology; and
- 15 (7) contingency planning and disaster
- 16 recovery.

17 D. Each executive agency plan shall be evaluated
18 against the following criteria:

- 19 (1) the agency has created a discernible
- 20 direction for information systems as represented by improving
- 21 the level of services to citizens, establishing pragmatic
- 22 measurements, identifying cost and benefit estimates,
- 23 demonstrating concern for quality products and performance,
- 24 establishing feasible, relevant, attainable and measurable
- 25 objectives;

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1 (2) the plan demonstrates a consistent,
2 interrelated action plan of the executive agency's mission and
3 strategic objectives in conjunction and coordination with its
4 information systems projects;

5 (3) the plan puts forth a demonstrated
6 leadership or management factor as represented by awareness of
7 training needs, recognition of and response to issues and
8 challenges, successful completion of projects, consideration
9 of alternative courses of action and development of strategies
10 that are results oriented for executive agency programs;

11 (4) the plan identifies sound technical
12 direction based on proven technology, with current technical
13 resources leveraged to gain maximum value, and the plan
14 comprehensively addresses potential limits of current and
15 proposed technology;

16 (5) the plan focuses on effective and
17 efficient use of available resources, including staff, funds,
18 existing capital and time;

19 (6) the plan clearly isolates risks and
20 recognizes and mitigates risks by providing for a realistic
21 assessment of risks, careful evaluation of alternative action,
22 flexibility to respond to changes and opportunities,
23 application of new concepts and techniques and systematic
24 evaluation of options in terms of results;

25 (7) the plan clearly demonstrates the value

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1 of projects to the agency, state government and the citizens
2 of the state as well as other customers and associates in the
3 form of costs, tangible benefits and intangible benefits;

4 (8) the plan specifically details communities
5 of interest, internal and external, for potential duplication
6 of effort and data sharing;

7 (9) conformance to planning processes as set
8 forth by the commission; and

9 (10) the plan demonstrates conformance to the
10 direction of the plans and policies of the overall strategic
11 plan, including conformance for methods and procedures for
12 disaster recovery, evidence of management commitment to
13 project implementation success and mitigation of risks, a
14 description of how the agency's information and communication
15 systems and databases are designed, provision that information
16 and communication bases are designed to work with communities
17 of interest to facilitate the sharing of information across
18 agencies and system conformance to overall information and
19 communication management and technology strategies.

20 Section 7. STATE-FUNDED INFORMATION SYSTEMS-- STRATEGIC
21 PLANNING-- REPORTS TO COMMISSION AND LEGISLATURE. --

22 A. An administering agency of a state-funded
23 information system that is not part of the executive branch of
24 state government shall develop and update annually a detailed
25 five-year strategic plan on information management for that

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1 system. The strategic plan shall define the policy direction
2 for the administering agency in the acquisition, use and
3 management of the information system, including services,
4 resources and services for the information system's users.

5 Each year's update of the plan shall include:

6 (1) an inventory of the current information
7 systems; and

8 (2) an evaluation of the necessity for
9 integration and compatibility of the information system with
10 other state-funded information systems, an evaluation of how
11 well that integration and compatibility are being accomplished
12 and a description of the barriers to integration and
13 compatibility.

14 B. The strategic plan shall be filed with the
15 commission and the legislative finance committee, along with
16 recommendations for legislative action needed to ensure
17 appropriate optimum integration and compatibility of
18 state-funded information systems.

19 C. The legislative finance committee may request
20 the assistance of experts to evaluate strategic plans and
21 budget requests for state-funded information systems.

22 D. For the purposes of this section,
23 "administering agency" means the organizational unit of a
24 state-funded branch, institution or political subdivision of
25 the state that is responsible for the development, maintenance

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1 and improvement of the branch's, institution's or political
2 subdivision's information system and includes the judicial
3 information system council, legislative council service,
4 public school districts and post-secondary educational
5 institutions.

6 Section 8. TERMINATION OF COMMISSION LIFE. --The
7 information systems management commission is terminated on
8 July 1, 2003 pursuant to the provisions of the Sunset Act.
9 The commission shall continue to operate until July 1, 2004.
10 Effective July 1, 2004, the Information Systems Management Act
11 is repealed.

12 Section 9. EFFECTIVE DATE. --The effective date of the
13 provisions of this act is July 1, 1999.

15 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

16 Section 1. SHORT TITLE. -- Sections 1 through 9 of this
17 act may be cited as the "Information Technology Management
18 Act".

19 Section 2. PURPOSE. -- The purpose of the Information
20 Technology Management Act is to:

21 A. assess and inventory current information
22 systems' services and resources;

23 B. coordinate the central and individual executive
24 agency information systems in a manner that ensures that the
25 most cost-effective and efficient information and
communication systems and resources are being used by

executive agencies;

C. develop a five-year state strategic plan for information and communication management that is updated annually by the information technology commission; and

D. promote data sharing between governmental entities and provide a mechanism for information technology expertise to be shared between the branches of state government and local governments.

Section 3. DEFINITIONS. -- As used in the Information Technology Management Act:

A. "agency plan" means an executive agency's annual information technology plan;

B. "commission" means the information technology commission;

C. "development project" means the period from when funding is made available for information technology development until after system implementation;

D. "executive agency" means a state agency of the executive branch of government;

E. "information technology" means computer and voice and data communication software and hardware, including imaging systems, terminals and communications networks and facilities, staff information systems services and professional services contracts for information systems services;

F. "office" means the information technology management office;

G. "state information architecture" includes the standards, guidelines, policies and protocols to implement information technology; and

H. "state strategic plan" means the executive information technology planning document that spans a three-

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1 to five-year period.

2 Section 4. COMMISSION CREATED-- MEMBERSHIP. --

3 A. The "information technology commission" is
4 created. The commission consists of thirteen members as
5 follows:

6 (1) five members appointed by the governor,
7 three of whom are from agencies whose primary funding is not
8 from internal service funds;

9 (2) one staff member with telecommunications
10 regulatory experience appointed by the chairman of the public
11 regulation commission;

12 (3) two members representing education, one
13 appointed by the commission on higher education and one
14 appointed by the president of the state board of education;

15 (4) two members from the national
16 laboratories; and

17 (5) three members appointed by the governor
18 to represent the public with information technology and
19 management experience, but who are not employees of the state
20 or a political subdivision of the state and who do not have
21 any financial interest in the state information systems or
22 state contracts. The public members shall serve for staggered
23 three-year terms.

24 B. Additionally, the following advisory members
25 may be appointed at the request of the commission:

(1) two members from the judicial information
systems council appointed by the chairman of the council;

(2) two members from the house of

1 representatives and two members from the senate appointed by
2 the New Mexico legislative council; and

3 (3) two members representing local
4 governments, one appointed by the New Mexico association of
5 counties and one appointed by the New Mexico municipal league.

6 C. The members of the commission who are not
7 supported by public money may receive per diem and mileage
8 pursuant to the Per Diem and Mileage Act, but shall receive no
9 other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

10 D. For the initial year of operation, the chief
11 information officer shall act as chairman. Thereafter, the
12 commission shall elect a chairman and vice chairman for a two-
13 year term.

14 E. The commission shall meet at least semiannually
15 and may meet at the call of the chairman or a majority of the
16 members.

17 Section 5. COMMISSION-- POWERS AND DUTIES. -- The
18 commission shall:

19 A. adopt and promulgate rules that specify the
20 state information architecture to implement the state
21 strategic plan;

22 B. adopt and promulgate other rules necessary for
23 the administration of the Information Technology Management
24 Act and the conduct of the affairs of the office;

25 C. develop strategies for identifying and managing
development projects that involve multiple agencies to ensure
appropriate and timely resolution of system development
problems;

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1 D. provide information technology planning
2 guidelines for agency annual plans;

3 E. update the state strategic plan annually,
4 including identifying areas of noncompliance with the state
5 strategic plan; and

6 F. submit proposed rules to the information
7 technology oversight committee for its review prior to
8 adoption.

9 Section 6. INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY MANAGEMENT OFFICE
10 CREATED-- ADMINISTRATIVE ATTACHMENT-- CHIEF INFORMATION
11 OFFICER-- QUALIFICATIONS-- STAFF. --

12 A. The "information technology management office"
13 is created. The office is administratively attached to the
14 office of the governor.

15 B. The head of the office is the "chief
16 information officer", who is appointed by the governor with
17 the advice and consent of the senate. The chief information
18 officer shall have a minimum of seven years' experience in the
19 management of a large information technology enterprise. The
20 chief information officer serves at the pleasure of the
21 governor.

22 C. The chief information officer may hire staff as
23 necessary to carry out the provisions of the Information
24 Technology Management Act. Staff of the office are subject to
25 the provisions of the Personnel Act.

Section 7. OFFICE-- POWERS AND DUTIES. --

A. The office may:

(1) obtain information, documents and records

1 that are not confidential by law from an executive agency as
2 needed to carry out the provisions of the Information
3 Technology Management Act;

4 (2) enter into contracts;

5 (3) perform performance or other audits or
6 reviews of executive agency development projects or management
7 processes; and

8 (4) when requested, offer assistance or
9 expertise to the judiciary, legislature, institutions of
10 higher education, counties, municipalities, public school
11 districts and other political subdivisions of the state.

12 B. The office shall:

13 (1) review agency plans and make
14 recommendations to the commission regarding prudent allocation
15 of information technology resources; reduction of data,
16 hardware and software redundancy; improving system
17 interoperability and data accessibility among agencies;

18 (2) approve executive agency requests for
19 proposals and information technology professional service
20 contracts for technical sufficiency as they pertain to
21 information technology;

22 (3) monitor executive agency compliance with
23 its agency plan, the state strategic plan and state
24 information architecture and report to the commission and
25 executive agency management on noncompliance;

(4) review information technology cost
recovery mechanisms and information systems rate structures of
executive agencies and make recommendations to the commission;

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1 (5) provide technical support to executive
2 agencies in the development of their agency plans;

3 (6) review appropriation requests related to
4 executive agency information technology requests to ensure
5 compliance with agency plans and the state strategic plan and
6 make written recommendations to the department of finance and
7 administration, the legislative finance committee and the
8 information technology oversight committee by November 30 of
9 each year;

10 (7) provide oversight of development
11 projects, including ensuring adequate risk management and
12 disaster recovery practices and monitor compliance with
13 strategies developed by the commission for timely resolution
14 of development project problems; and

15 (8) perform any other function assigned by
16 the commission.

17 Section 8. AGENCY PLANS--CERTIFICATION.--

18 A. Agency plans shall:

19 (1) be consistent with the state strategic
20 plan;

21 (2) demonstrate the executive agency has
22 developed information technology objectives consistent with
23 the agency plan, the state strategic plan and the state
24 information technology architecture;

25 (3) show appropriate coordination with other
executive agencies to improve customer service and reduce
redundant data, hardware and software;

(4) include information about information

1 technology objectives, inventories, data and expenditures for
2 each fiscal year;

3 (5) demonstrate consistency with
4 appropriations and budgets approved by the department of
5 finance and administration; and

6 (6) include any other components required by
7 the office or the commission.

8 B. Prior to making information technology
9 purchases, an executive agency shall certify to the office
10 that its proposed information technology purchases are
11 consistent with its agency plan, the information architecture
12 adopted by the commission and the state strategic plan. The
13 office may delay or stop a purchase if it believes that the
14 proposed purchase may not meet the requirements of the agency
15 plan, state information architecture or state strategic plan.

16 Section 9. TERMINATION OF AGENCY LIFE--DELAYED REPEAL. --
17 The information technology commission and information
18 technology management office are terminated July 1, 2005
19 pursuant to the Sunset Act. The commission and office shall
20 continue to operate according to the provisions of the
21 Information Technology Management Act until July 1, 2006.
22 Effective July 1, 2006, that act is repealed.

23 Section 10. INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE
24 CREATED-- APPOINTMENT. --

25 A. The "information technology oversight
committee" is created as a joint interim legislative
committee. The committee shall function from the date of its
appointment until December 1 prior to the first session of the

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1 forty-seventh legislature unless terminated earlier by the New
2 Mexico legislative council.

3 B. The committee shall be composed of eight
4 members. The New Mexico legislative council shall appoint
5 four members from the house of representatives and four
6 members from the senate. At the time of making the
7 appointments, the legislative council shall designate the
8 chairman and the vice chairman.

9 C. Members shall be appointed from each house so
10 as to give the two major political parties in each house the
11 same proportionate representation on the committee as prevails
12 in each house; however, in no event shall either party have
13 less than one member from each house on the committee. At the
14 request of the committee chairman, members may be removed from
15 the committee by the legislative council for nonattendance
16 according to council policy. Vacancies on the committee,
17 however caused, may be filled by the legislative council or
18 the council may reduce the size of the committee by not making
19 replacement appointments and, in such case, need not readjust
20 party representation.

21 D. No action shall be taken by the committee if a
22 majority of the total membership from either house on the
23 committee rejects such action.

24 E. Staff for the committee shall be furnished by
25 the legislative council service. The legislative council
service may request the assistance of the legislative finance
committee in staffing the committee.

Section 11. OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE DUTIES. --

1 A. The information technology oversight committee
2 shall hold one organizational meeting each year to develop a
3 work plan and budget for the ensuing interim. The work plan
4 and budget shall be submitted to the New Mexico legislative
5 council for approval.

6 B. The committee shall:

7 (1) monitor the work of the information
8 technology commission and the information technology
9 management office, including reviewing the commission's rules
10 setting out the policies, standards, procedures and guidelines
11 for information architecture and development projects and the
12 annual update of the state strategic plan;

13 (2) oversee the implementation of the
14 Information Technology Management Act, the work of the
15 judicial information systems council and division and any
16 other state-funded systems;

17 (3) meet on a regular basis to receive and
18 evaluate periodic reports from the information technology
19 commission and information technology management office; and

20 (4) perform such other related duties as
21 assigned by the legislative council.

22 C. The committee shall make a report of its
23 findings and recommendations for the consideration of each
24 session of the legislature. The report and any suggested
25 legislation shall be made available to the legislative council
by December 31 preceding that session.

Section 12. APPROPRIATIONS. --

A. One hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000)

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1 is appropriated from the general fund to the information
2 technology office for expenditure in fiscal year 1999 to carry
3 out the provisions of the Information Technology Management
4 Act. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the
5 end of fiscal year 1999 shall revert to the general fund.

6 B. Seven hundred thousand dollars (\$700,000) is
7 appropriated from the general fund to the information
8 technology office for expenditure in fiscal year 2000 to carry
9 out the provisions of the Information Technology Management
10 Act. Any unexpended or unencumbered balance remaining at the
11 end of fiscal year 2000 shall revert to the general fund.
